What have KS2 been up to?

This half term KS2 have been looking at Charlie and the Chocolate Factory in their Literacy lessons. Pupils have designed their own chocolate bars and the wrappers for them, as well as describing the taste after eating it! They all considered what made a chocolate bar appealing to customers when it's on the shelf and what flavours they would like for a chocolate bar. The focus of chocolate in Literacy links to the topic of the Aztec civilisation.

KS2 produced a wonderful scene from Charlie and the chocolate factory during Drama lessons, each taking on speaking roles and developing their characters over a few weeks. They were so proud of what they had produced, they wanted to show Mr Whyle who was very impressed by the acting skills of his pupils! Fun fact: Did you know that the Aztecs discovered the cocoa bean, which is used to make chocolate?! The pupils learn what life was like during the Aztec era, where the Aztecs lived and how their civilisation had different social classes. In Maths pupils have been learning to add and subtract numbers using 'mental methods'.

hrough their RE lessons KS2 have looked at inspirational people. Discussing who is inspirational to them, who is inspirational to different religions and how the beliefs of these religions were upheld by the inspirational people. Children have also decorated some beautiful Sugar skulls or known as "Calaveras" in Mexican. We have learning about the Mexican festival 'Dia de los Muertos' (meaning Day of the Dead) and how the Mexican culture traditionally celebrate this event.


KS2 pupils have been creating their own puppets in their DT lessons, which will be ready to come home with them in time for Christmas. The pupils have had determine which animals would make good puppets and consider the materials that are best to use, whilst learning how to use a range of different tools and skills. During Art lessons this term, KS2 pupils have been learning about Vikings. Pupils were delighted when Mr Dean Russell from The House of Twin Tailed Lion Re-enactment Group kindly dressed up in his full costume to show them how a real Viking would dress for battle. Mr Russell allowed pupils to try on his Viking shield, Helmet, and they were able to look and feel the weight of chainmail. This then inspired pupils to design and make their own shields and helmets.

Mrs Morris was very impressed with pupils' results and how hard pupils worked to create superb armoury.

"Year 7 have had an excellent start to the new school year. New students have taken to Rosewood like a duck to water and our previous Year 6's have continued their excellent work and effort in this year since moving over to the main body of the school. I have been incredibly impressed.

In the first half term, we completed units one and two. Unit one focused on 'Analysing and displaying data'. The students created graphs and charts from a set of results and was able to draw comparisons and similarities from different sets because of their charts. Something that will be invaluable as they progress in life.

Similarly, Unit two, 'Number skills', will also be very important in their life. This unit focused on the core aspects of Mathematics. Addition, subtraction, multiplication, division, time, and money. During this period, you could see the confidence of the students developing as they started to believe in their own ability more!

Since returning from half term, Unit three, 'Expressions, functions and formulae' has been our focus. This topic involves algebra which students can often find difficult and can't often see how it is used in day-to-day life. But the students have tried incredibly hard and produced work that they should be proud of.

For example, one pupil at first didn't see the point in learning about algebra, but after seeing examples of how it is used in life, such as budgeting, cooking (ingredients), shopping, he shown an excellent attitude towards the work. I was really impressed with how quickly he understood how to simplify expressions.

FUN SCIENCE FACTS FROM MR AFSAR

1. BABIES HAVE AROUND 100 MORE BONES THAN ADULTS.

Babies have about 300 bones at birth, with cartilage between many of them. This extra flexibility helps them pass through the birth canal and also allows for rapid growth. With age, many of the bones fuse, leaving 206 bones that make up an average adult skeleton.

2. SOME METALS ARE SO REACTIVE THAT THEY EXPLODE ON CONTACT WITH WATER.

There are certain metals – including potassium, sodium, lithium, rubidium and caesium – that are so reactive that they oxidise (or tarnish) instantly when exposed to air. They can even produce explosions when dropped in water! All elements strive to be chemically stable – in other words, to have a full outer electron shell. To achieve this, metals tend to shed electrons. The alkali metals have only one electron on their outer shell, making them ultra-keen to pass on this unwanted passenger to another element via bonding. As a result they form compounds with other elements so readily that they don't exist independently in nature.

3. STOMACH ACID IS STRONG ENOUGH TO DISSOLVE STAINLESS STEEL.

Your stomach digests food thanks to highly corrosive hydrochloric acid with a pH of 2 to 3. This acid also attacks your stomach lining, which protects itself by secreting an alkali bicarbonate solution. The lining still needs to be replaced continually, and it entirely renews itself every four days.

4. A FLEA CAN ACCELERATE FASTER THAN THE SPACE SHUTTLE.

A jumping flea reaches dizzying heights of about eight centimetres (three inches) in a millisecond. Acceleration is the change in speed of an object over time, often measured in 'g's, with one g equal to the acceleration caused by gravity on Earth (9.8 metres/32.2 feet per square second). Fleas experience 100 g, while the Space Shuttle peaked at around 5 g. The flea's secret is a stretchy rubber-like protein which allows it to store and release energy like a spring.

5. VENUS IS THE ONLY PLANET TO SPIN CLOCKWISE.

Our Solar System started off as a swirling cloud of dust and gas which eventually collapsed into a spinning disc with the Sun at its centre. Because of this common origin, all the planets move around the Sun in the same direction and on roughly the same plane. They also all spin in the same direction (counter-clockwise if observed from 'above') – except Uranus and Venus. Uranus spins on its side, while Venus defiantly spins in the complete opposite direction. The most likely cause of these planetary oddballs are gigantic asteroids which knocked them off course in the distant past.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

This term Year 9 pupils have been taking part in swimming lessons, they have improved their skills in front crawl, breast stroke and butterfly. Pupils who were new to swimming are doing extremely well and are starting to participate without swimming aids.

Year 9 are studying badminton and table tennis this half term and are doing extremely well and are showing good progression.

The PE department have organised a trip next year where some pupils will be able to see the England Open Badminton Championships.

DESIGN AND TECHNOLOGY

There has been a hive of activity in the DT room since returning. All pupils really have got back into the spirit of the subject with lots of creativity, critical and innovative thinking. They certainly know how to make the most of lessons and are as keen as ever to learn new skills and use any new tools and equipment – this term has seen the arrival of the new resin 3D Printer amongst some other enjoyable fun new items.

Key Stage 2 pupils have been designing and making animal inspired toy puppets, where the boys have been using basic wood tools, picking up measuring, cutting and finishing skills along the way.

Year 7 pupils have just completed the design and make something that moves on water challenge, where the boys get to use the workshop, make and test something but most importantly the boys get express their own ideas. As normal the boys came up with some unique designs.

Year 8 have been learning 2D CAD design skills, basic electronics and how to solder. The boys have soldered kits to make simple torches, playable electronic xylophones and mini powered amps.

Year 9 pupils have been exploring modern and smart materials and designed products incorporating these new materials with some great ideas. They are currently learning some old fashion skills making log reindeers and honing new age skills with some laser cut designs.

Year 10 are responding well to the step up to Key Stage for and have covered the fundamentals of design thinking and considerations, learned some new skills in Onshape 3D design as well as gaining skills and knowledge in the new Crumble programming kits and then applying these new skills to real world problems – this cool little water pump activates when water exceeds a certain level, ideal protection for flood hit properties

Year 11 have had there heads down, researching hard for the start of their GCSE NEA Coursework which goes toward their final grade. The boys are covering the briefs of either educational play or outdoor eating. They are nearing the design section which really does get fun but sadly exam codes of practise prohibit any public sharing of live work! But here is a car that they worked on together to make and programme in an end of half term fun session.



RELIGIOUS EDUCATION

YEAR 10 - STAFFORDSHIRE REGIMENT MUSEUM

Year 10's visited Staffordshire Regiment Museum in September as part of their Religious Education curriculum. They explored inspirational people from WWI and WWII and had a guided tour around the museum.

Whilst there they were able to ask questions to an experienced and knowledgeable tour guide, they were able to walk around and explore trenches and went down the mines. Pupils then explored other aspects of life for the soldiers such as weaponry and uniform.



Year 8/9 Buddhism Trip

Year 8's and 9's visited Birmingham Buddhist Vihara in September as part of their Religious Education Curriculum. Whilst there, they had a guided tour around the Pagoda and got to ask questions to their tour guide.

Animal Therapy

Our pupils have enjoyed an eventful year on our Farm. Rosewood (pupils and staff!) have successfully cared for and watched eggs hatch into 8 chicks.

Pupils have had the chance to see different stages of how chickens grow and have seen first hand their personalities develop into their own individual characters.

Earlier this year we were joined by two playful Pygmy Goats, who have settled in at Rosewood very well. Meet Ant and Dec!



A great opportunity has recently arisen which has given the chance for some of our pupils to attend Sedgley Activity Farm to take part in 5 week animal care course. Pupils will learn in depth about animal care and will receive a certificate on completion.

Drama

Since September KS2, Year 7 and 8 have been working hard in our new subject, Drama. We have been working alongside other subjects and crossing curriculum, predominantly with English and PSHE.

Year 7 have been working hard on their basic skills of Drama and even begun the difficult task of improvisation work. Watching the boys go from being shy and nervous in their first few lessons, to confidently coming up with lines on the spot has been fabulous to see. It has been a pleasure to observe each pupils confidence grow. Keep it up!

In Year 8 drama we have been exploring homelessness, linking in with their English work on the book "Stone Cold". They created a small five minute piece through freeze frames, working together to cast the parts and direct each scene. Their work on using a stimulus to create a scene is also coming along nicely; as the boys are using a simple picture to come up with ideas for a story from it. They are beginning to approach the subject with more maturity and are able to discuss serious topics with a grown up attitude.

Both Miss Sayce and Miss Rudge have been incredibly impressed with how each year has thrown themselves into the subject, and are looking forward to taking all three year groups on a trip to Wolverhampton grand to watch the Pantomime as an extension to their learning!

Project

Over the Summer and Autumn term, pupils have been working some new practical skills. We have focused on fixing plumbing leaks and most recently have moved on to some basic electrics, such as rewiring plugs and sockets.

Pupils have picked up these skills very quickly and confidently. We may have some future tradesmen on our hands!



SENCO

Currently, we have lots of exciting things happening in the SEN department. There are many interventions being carried out daily.

As well as holistic therapy, pupils have access to many educational interventions such as 1:1 reading, group phonics and spelling, Rapid Plus Series (reading and comprehension) and on-going support in English, Maths and Science.

We are continuing to work closely with the outside agencies that are listed below. Recently, a new Educational Psychologist, a Speech and Language Therapist and a Dyslexia Specialist have started work with us.

Pupils are assessed each term (unless they have reached a reading and/or spelling age of 12+ where they are tested once a year, or receive interventions where they are tested half termly).

Pupils who have worked hard, or have made significant progress, are now being invited on trips, with Mr Kirk and Mrs Hand, to Waterstones where they can choose some books of their own.




A FEW FIGURES

• 88% of pupils have received at least one educational intervention over the last half term.

• 70% of pupils made 1 year (or above) progress in reading last year.

• 73% of pupils made 1 year (or above) progress with spelling last year.

• 67% of pupils are above the age of 12 years in reading.



Road Safety Week 2021

For Road Safety Week 2021 Year 8 gained their Bikeability Level 2.

Level 2 teaches children to grow more confident with and experience "real" cycling on the road. Accompanied by instructors and Mr Phillips, our Year 8's spent a day and a half learning travel skills in the classroom, and then onto negotiating the local roads.

This included junctions, crossroads and roundabouts, and sharing the road with other vehicles.






Anti-Bullying Week 2021






Dates for your diary
